From the Rabbi



Dear friends,

We've just come through the season containing the major Jewish holiday celebrated by more Jews than any other in the year. Pesach is beloved with good reason. The story of liberation at its heart continues to resound in us as the Jewish people's core narrative about who we are. And hey, who doesn't enjoy "Dayenu" and the Four Questions and matzah ball soup?

In the season covered by this newsletter we'll reach the major Jewish holiday which may be celebrated by fewer Jews than any other: Shavuot. Of the three great pilgrimage festivals our people once observed, two now have celebrations with obvious appeal. Sukkot -- you get to decorate a little harvest house and dine al fresco. Pesach -- there's the Passover seder. But the word Shavuot probably doesn't raise a ton of memories for most of you. For a long time it didn't say much to me, either.

In the ancient agricultural cycle, Pesach was time to bring the first spring grain to the Temple. Meanwhile, grain planted on the second day of Pesach would be cultivated for 49 days and on the 50th day brought to the Temple. In the wake of the Temple's fall, the rabbinic tradition needed to find a new way to understand Shavuot. That new way came in the form of the teaching that it was on Shavuot -the 50th day after the Exodus -- that the Jewish people received Torah at Sinai.

For years we here at CBI have celebrated Shavuot with a late-night Torah study session with the folks from Beth El in Bennington, which many of you have enjoyed. But as fun as midnight Torah learning is, it doesn't hold the same wealth of memories and associations as a night in a sukkah or a Pesach seder meal.

This year I'm inviting CBI members to make some deep Shavuot memories. Join me in a small pilgrimage of our own: to Isabella Freedman Jewish Retreat Center (now a part of Hazon) in Falls Village, Connecticut, from June 10-13. Ours is one of several ALEPH network communities in the Northeast aiming to hold its congregational observance of Shavuot at Isabella Freedman. Rabba Kaya Stern-Kaufman from Rimon is bringing her membership. My friend and colleague Rabbi David Evan Markus, whom many of you know, is bringing his community from City Island. And I'm excited about bringing our community.

There's nothing like an immersive retreat experience. All of your needs are met. (And the food at Isabella Freedman is amazing, organic, and homegrown.) There will be all kinds of opportunities for spiritual practice, from a variety of late-night classes, to joyful and participatory prayer (singing and dancing beside the lake optional), to meditation and yoga, to walking on the trails around and behind Lake Miriam. There's a kids' program, so that adults can enjoy grown-up festive time while kids are learning and having fun.

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Like our ancestors of old, when we come together in pilgrimage we are doubly blessed: with the experience of celebrating the festival, and with the experience of connecting with community. On a retreat gathering we can kindle new friendships and strengthen old ones. The last time I attended the Shavuot retreat at Isabella Freedman, my son was an infant and I strolled him around the back of the room in his stroller at 3am to keep him sleeping so I could hear Reb Zalman teach.

This year I'll be teaching there, along with a terrific teaching roster that includes Rabbinic Pastor Eve Ilsen, the widow of Reb Zalman of blessed memory, who has been teaching at Isabella Freedman on Shavuot for many years. I don't know whether she'll be teaching on dreams, on aging to sage-ing work, on the journey of grief or on something else entirely, but whatever she teaches will be terrific.

Because CBI is part of the ALEPH Network, we're receiving a substantial discount on the Shavuot retreat. If you enter the code VELVETEEN in your registration, you'll get \$150 taken off the costs of the retreat. There's also some congregational support available for members wishing to attend this retreat; reach out to me if that interests you, though please do so quickly.

The Kotzker rebbe taught that it's important that we say not that God gave us the Torah at Sinai, but that we began receiving it there. Because had God only given it in that moment, that would have been time-limited. God gave, and that's the end. But because what happened on that date was that God began giving Torah to us, we know that the gift continues to flow.

I hope that many of you will join me for Shavuot to experience the revelation of Torah in all four worlds of body, heart, mind, and spirit. And for all of us, whether we're on retreat or staying home, may Torah continue to flow into our lives, now and always.

CBI & Northeast Renewal Shavuot Retreat Isabella Freedman Jewish Retreat Center Falls Village, Connecticut June 10-13, 2016

Every family who came to CBI's second-night community seder (Saturday, April 23) should have received a copy of Rabbi Rachel's latest collection of poems: 49 poems intended to enrich the period of the counting of the Omer, the 49 days between Pesach and Shavuot. Did your family get theirs? Here's what others have said about her collection:

The Omer is the period of 49 days between Pesach (Passover) and Shavuot. Through counting the Omer, we link liberation with revelation. Once we counted the days between the Pesach barley offering and the Shavuot wheat offering at the Temple in Jerusalem. Now as we count the days we prepare an internal harvest of reflection, discernment, and readiness. Kabbalistic (mystical) and Mussar (personal refinement) traditions offer lenses through which we can examine ourselves as we prepare ourselves to receive Torah anew at Shavuot. Here are 49 poems, one for each day of the Omer, accompanied by helpful Omer-counting materials. Use these poems to deepen your own practice as we move together through this sevenweek corridor of holy time.

If you want to light Shabbat candles and make havdalah at the halakhically accepted times, here they are:

May 6 7:41 lighting; May 7: 8:50 havdalah May 13 7:48 lighting; May 14: 8:58 havdalah May 20 7:56 lighting; May 21: 9:05 havdalah May 27 8:02 lighting; May 28: 9:11 havdalah Jun 3 8:08 lighting; Jun 4: 9:16 havdalah Jun 10 8:12 lighting; Jun 11: 9:20 havdalah Jun 17 8:15 lighting; Jun 18: 9:23 havdalah Jun 24 8:16 lighting; Jun 25: 9:24 havdalah

More from the Rabbi: Want To Meet With Me?

One of the great joys of this line of work is meeting when y'all want to talk. Whether you want to talk about synagogue business or about the intimate happenings of your spiritual life or your heart, I am honored to be able to listen to you.

In an emergency, I am always available. If the situation is not an emergency, I want to encourage you to reach out and make an appointment to see me (rather than just dropping in.)

I usually spend Mondays and Fridays doing synagogue work, but sometimes that work takes me out of the building -- e.g. if someone makes a pastoral care appointment with me and wants to meet at their place instead of at the shul -- so even on the days when I'm fully focused on synagogue work, I'm not always sitting behind the desk in the synagogue office.

If you know you're going to want to meet with me, it's helpful to me if you can drop me an email or give me a call and set up a meeting time. That way I can block out thirty minutes or an hour on my calendar, and I'll know that I will be dedicating that time to you (so I won't, for instance, be counting on that as time I need in order to prepare for Shabbat or whatever is next on my docket.)

I look forward to seeing you at CBI!
