From the Rabbi



Holy friends,

One of the joys of being Jews in today's world is that each year, we get two opportunities to begin again. In the fall we get Rosh Hashanah, the beginning of the Jewish year -- an opportunity to make teshuvah, to re/turn ourselves in the right direction again and to repair our relationships with others, with ourselves, and with our Source. And in midwinter we get the Gregorian New Year, the beginning of the secular year -- an opportunity to...Hmm. I'm not sure. How would you end that sentence? What is the secular new year an opportunity to do, for you?

For me the first day of the secular new year is an opportunity to eat black-eyed peas, symbolic of what in Hebrew we call parnassah (income, money, fiscal abundance). That's an old southern custom I learned from my mother and from her mother -- who though she was Czech gladly adopted some of the traditions of those around her! Moving deeper into the new year, there's usually an opportunity to enjoy the snow, assuming we get any this year (as I write these words, a few weeks before the newsletter comes out, the ground is still bare... though surely it won't stay that way.)

And the secular new year offers an opportunity, as the days grow the tiniest bit longer, to begin preparing myself for the annual journey toward spring. Of course, whether you're reading this in January or in February, spring's a long way off. And because this year is a leap year, our spring holidays are a long way off, too.

You may already know that the Jewish calendar is "metonic," also known as "lunisolar." It isn't purely lunar (like the Muslim calendar, which is roughly 10 days shorter than the Gregorian calendar, so that if Ramadan begins on October 1 one year, it will begin on September 20 the next year, and September 10 the year after that, and so on.) And it isn't purely solar (like the Gregorian calendar, in which the 4th of July always falls on, well, the fourth day of July.)

We use a lunar calendar with some solar additions, so that our spring holidays are always in the spring and our fall holidays are aways in the fall. In the northern hemisphere, that is. The sages who created our calendar did not know about the southern hemisphere.

What this means in practice is that seven years out of every nineteen, we add an extra month to the calendar. Whereas a secular Leap Year has one extra day (February 29), a Jewish leap year has four extra weeks -- we insert an extra month of Adar, called Adar Aleph (Adar 1), before the regular month of Adar which becomes Adar Bet (Adar 2.) That's why Purim this year doesn't happen until the end of March, and Passover doesn't happen until the end of April. From the Rabbi continued:

This year we get an extra-long journey into Jewish springtime. What might you want to add to your life during this year's extended Jewish winter, so that when we make our way to Purim and Pesach you are truly ready for spring? Consider taking an online class (I'll be teaching one on writing psalms -- see the ALEPH website), taking on a new spiritual practice (perhaps the bedtime shema, or the morning gratitude prayer? ask me if you want a copy of either one), or experimenting with a new mitzvah (Shabbat candles? Visiting the sick? Blessing your food?) I'm happy to help you brainstorm and help you come up with whatever you need in order to try a new mitzvah on this winter.

Don't let the long winter doldrums get you down. Who knows what blessings you might unlock in your life during this winter's extra month of Jewish time?

Rabbi Jill Hammer Reads from The Hebrew Priestess on February 27th



On Saturday, February 27 Temple Anshe Amunim, and CBI co-sponsor Rabbi Jill Hammer reading from, and speak about, her groundbreaking new book, The Hebrew Priestess: Ancient and New Visions of Jewish Women's Spiritual Leadership. This ground-breaking book delineates 13 models of spiritual leadership (among them prophetess, weaver, shrinekeeper, midwife, mother, maiden, witch, and fool) and shows how each model of women's leadership manifested in ancient times and throughout Jewish history, and how women in our day are following that path. The Hebrew Priestess weaves a careful examination of historical priestesses with the personal experiences of women who embarked on this new path of Jewish priestesshood as part of the Kohenet Hebrew Priestess Institute, which Jill Hammer and Taya Shere founded in 2005. During our evening, Rabbi Jill Hammer, PhD, will speak about the book, and about priestesses of the Bible and beyond. We'll consider the gifts this model of spiritual leadership can bring us in the present.

If you want to light Shabbat candles and make havdalah at the halakhically-accepted times, here they are:

Jan 5 4:11 lighting; Jan 6 5:20 havdalah Jan 8 4:18 lighting; Jan 9 5:27 havdalah Jan 15 4:26 lighting; Jan 16 5:35 havdalah Jan 22 4:34 lighting; Jan 23 5:43 havdalah Jan 29 4:43 lighting; Jan 30 5:53 havdalah Feb 5 4:53 lighting; Feb 6 6:02 havdalah Feb 12 5:02 lighting; Feb 13 6:11 havdalah Feb 19 5:11 lighting; Feb 20 6:20 havdalah Feb 26 5:20 lighting; Feb 27 6:29 havdalah If it is your practice to light candles at a different hour of the day (perhaps not quite so early as halakha indicates during the winter, and not quite so late as halakha indicates during the summer), that's also a legitimate Reform Jewish choice. What's most important is that you're finding a way to incorporate Shabbat into your life.



The Annual Meeting

The Annual Meeting took place on November 10th with about 24 people in attendance. Prior to the meeting there was a dinner of Pizza and pot luck offerings. This year we had child care available. Copies of the full minutes and copies of the by-laws are available by contacting Jack Hockridge. The following is a brief rundown.

After a welcome from Pattie Lipman, the Minutes from the 2014 Annual Meeting were approved as was the Treasurer's Report. Treasurer Hogan reported that we did well in Fiscal Year 2015 – had a roughly \$15,000 surplus. However, we are anticipating a deficit for 2016. Key revenue items are the appeal, dues, and education funds.

The Building and Grounds Report was given by Chair David Pomerantz. He went over completed work this past year and projects likely for 2016. He also asked for anyone interested in volunteering to contact him. David also noted that many projects are done by volunteers. If interested in volunteering, please contact David.

The Membership Report was given by Vice President, Liz Miller. Besides recommending a dues increase the Board re-examined membership categories.

A Motion to adjust the wording of the Associate Membership category such that the five years of membership required need not be immediately preceding the application for associate membership was passed unanimously.

The Membership Committee created new sponsorship membership categories to facilitate giving, effective immediately.

Ed Oshinsky reported for Take and Eat, gratefully noting the \$2500 grant from the Jewish Woman's Foundation of Berkshire County. Ed said Take and Eat will still need additional money/donations to keep the program running for 2017.

Jane Shiyah reported on Chesed, our Caring Committee that btw needs additional members. Jane also made a suggestion that it would be nice to have volunteer work be a requirement of synagogue membership; maybe a requirement of 4 hours per year. There was some discussion of this. Rabbi and Jane will work on a proposal to bring to the Board. Jane also made an announcement about the co-housing project she is working on.

Liz Miller gave the report for Education and Chaim Bronstein spoke about Adult Learning.

Pattie Lipman gave the President's Report, and thanked various people for their volunteerism over the year, including Erin Marshall who stepped down from the Board. She also congratulated Reb Rachel for her election as co-Chair of Aleph, the Alliance for Jewish Renewal. Pattie emphasized that the Board wants to hear the Congregation's suggestions and comments about where to direct attention in the coming year.

Complete information on the dues increase that will go into effect on July 1, 2016 and the new voluntary membership categories to facilitate giving will be sent early in 2016.

My Father, by Paulette Wein

I hope you don't think I'm bragging when I say that I won the lottery when I got Eugene Wein for a father. For those of you who have only known my dad for a few years ... he was a well-respected businessman ... a leader in the local Jewish community ... a doting husband (my mother's friends wished their husbands would be a little more like Gene Wein) ... an amazing father who let us get away with murder ... and a passionate fan of Drury High School sports. He started going to Drury basketball and football games with his Uncle Charlie in the 1920's and '30s, and never stopped. Even in February 1991 when he was preparing for quadruple bypass surgery, he begged Dr. Sullivan to let him go to the Drury basketball game with his IV pole. Dr. Sullivan said no.

My father loved being with his children. We spent a lot of time in his shoe store on Eagle Street, using it as our own personal playground. It was before cell phones, of course, and I would tie up my father's phone in the store for hours at a time talking to my friends. My father never minded ... he was just happy to see me. He took us kids to an endless number of Drury basketball and football games. He often told the story of taking me to my first football game, and I burst out crying when I realized that we'd actually have to sit outside in the cold all evening. He taught us right from wrong not with words but by how he lived his life and how he treated others. Yes, he was known to swear at a basketball referee or two, and he certainly preferred winning to losing ... but we watched my dad take pride in every student athlete, whether he or she was the star of the team or a hard-working substitute who sat on the bench. Seeing a basketball player's name on the Drury High School honor roll was as important to my dad as watching a player throw the winning basket. Well ... almost as important.

When asked to name his favorite Drury basketball players of all time, he'd become visibly uncomfortable, not wanting to leave out anyone. I knew who his favorite basketball players were but, as my friend Lisa said to me yesterday, "I think everyone who played for Drury believed that he or she was your father's favorite." And that's how Sherry, Roberta, Larry, and I felt. We were each his favorite. We all felt special. I never wanted to live far from my parents ... even when I lived just two miles from them in North Adams, I was homesick.

One of our favorite traditions, up until a few years ago when my dad could no longer travel, was going to the March Madness western Massachusetts and state basketball tournaments. Six games in a row, 12 straight hours of basketball. We traveled to the Springfield CivicCenter, the Cage at UMass, and the Boston Garden to watch high school basketball. My father's eyes were glued to every second of every game ... except when I skipped out for a break and was gone too long, and he'd come looking for me to be sure I was safe. No one will ever worry about me the way my parents did.

During every phase of my life, my friends adored my father. As kids, he'd pile us all into the car and take us to Friendly's or Howard Johnson's for ice cream. He even took our friends' younger brothers and sisters when they didn't want to be left behind. After Larry and I learned to drive, not only did my parents always let us use the family car to go out with our friends ... but my father even filled the gas tank before we went out!

For those of you who only knew my dad during his prime, before he had Parkinson's, I'd like to tell you about the special people who came into our lives when his health began to fail. Our dear friend, Stephen Michalenko, filled my father's last few years with laughter, and he became like a son to my father, in addition to being a care-giver. As his body weakened, my father found strength through Stephen.

The extraordinary nurses and especially the nursing assistants at Williamstown Commons loved my father as if he was their grandfather. They have the most difficult and stressful jobs I have ever witnessed, yet our nursing home friends took the time to shower my dad with compassion – and hugs and kisses – until he took his last breath. I swear that they were the reason he lived so long. I will never, ever forget them.

As talking, eating, and even moving grew more difficult, my father had every reason to be unhappy, but instead he accepted his illness with grace and dignity. Our whole lives he showed us how to live, and in his last hours on Sunday he showed us how to finish life.

I hope and pray that my parents are together. During an early morning text the other day when I had trouble sleeping, I told my friend Lisa that I imagined my mother greeting my father with "Boobsie, I've been waiting for you! I missed you!" And Lisa responded, "And your father said, 'I missed you too, Boobsie ... now let's go get some ice cream!""



More from the Rabbi: Want To Meet With Me?

One of the great joys of this line of work is meeting when y'all want to talk. Whether you want to talk about synagogue business or about the intimate happenings of your spiritual life or your heart, I am honored to be able to listen to you.

In an emergency, I am always available. If the situation is not an emergency, I want to encourage you to reach out and make an appointment to see me (rather than just dropping in.)

I usually spend Mondays and Fridays doing synagogue work, but sometimes that work takes me out of the building -- e.g. if someone makes a pastoral care appointment with me and wants to meet at their place instead of at the shul -- so even on the days when I'm fully focused on synagogue work, I'm not always sitting behind the desk in the synagogue office.

If you know you're going to want to meet with me, it's helpful for me if you can drop me an email or give me a call and set up a meeting time. That way I can block out thirty minutes or an hour on my calendar, and I'll know that I will be dedicating that time to you (so I won't, for instance, be counting on that as time I need in order to prepare for Shabbat or whatever is next on my docket.)
